Greetings from President Van Fleet

Dear Colleagues,

Happy end of the semester and happy holidays! It is exciting and a bit daunting to realize that our conference - and the end of my presidential year - is less than 6 weeks away. When I wrote in September, I highlighted the strategic plan and several key areas in which the Association was progressing. Today I'd like to bring you up to date on other activities that support our strategic directions.

Our 2008 Conference Program Planning team, chaired by Michele Cloonan and Ann Bishop, has worked diligently to produce an event that reflects our enduring purpose and mission. Jim Elmborg and the Conference Juried Papers Committee are to be commended for the "goodness of fit" of the selected papers with the conference "Community Engagement: Integrating Learning, Research, and Practice." The first ALISE Linworth Youth Services Paper Award recipient will be recognized and two new and exciting awards will be announced in Philadelphia.

ALISE continues to develop professional development opportunities for our members. As a result of a recommendation of the Membership Advisory Committee, the Board has established the "ALISE Academy: Managing Your Career from Ph.D. to Retirement," a series of professional development workshops beginning with the 2009 ALISE Conference. This year, a publishing panel offers an opportunity to meet with editors of LIS journals to gain insights into the scholarly publishing process.

ALISE is working to enhance LIS education and to broaden membership. In recognition of the growing number of adjunct faculty in LIS programs, and in support of our strategic direction, ALISE will submit a proposal to the Institute for Museum and Library Services. Past-president John Budd is lead author on the proposal, "Enhancing Instructional Quality: Preparing Adjunct and Part-Time Teachers."

Jerry Saye, who has contributed so much to the ALISE Statistical Report, resigned as editor earlier this year. As we make the transition to a new editor, the data gathering procedures, content and format of the Report are being evaluated. The ALISE Statistical Report Advisory Committee, ably chaired by Kathleen Burnet, conducted a needs analysis, surveying Deans and Directors, Report chapter authors, and School Representatives. Significant work has been done to bring the Report up to date and good progress is being made. If you have ideas, about the Report, I invite you to send them to Kathy Burnett, Gloria Leckie (chair of the Publications Coordinating Committee), or me.

Finally, I want to congratulate Linda Smith, Vice-President/President-elect and Susan Romans, new Director for External Relations for their recent election. On behalf of the Association, I also extend my appreciation to Joe Mika and Ann O'Neil for their willingness to stand for office and for their past and continued support of ALISE. 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IMLS Grants

\$2.2 Million for Native American and Native Hawaiian Communities for Library Enhancements

Fourteen Native American tribal communities and Alaska Native villages received awards totaling \$1,753,300 to improve library services to their communities, announced Anne-Imelda M. Radice, Ph.D., Director of the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), the primary source of federal funds for U.S. museums and libraries. Radice also announced an award of \$519,700 to Alu Like, Inc.'s Native Hawaiian Library in Honolulu. Twenty-three federally recognized tribes will receive grants for museum projects totaling more than \$1 million from the Institute of Museum and Library Services ((IMLS). Three Institutions Awarded over \$1 million in Grants for Digital Innovation

The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) and the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) announced the first three grant recipients under Advancing Knowledge: The IMLS/NEH Digital Partnership, a funding opportunity that brings together museum, library, archive, and IT professionals with humanities scholars to spur innovative digital projects. The Historical Society of Pennsylvania; Tufts University, Medford; and the University of California, Berkeley will receive a combined total of \$1,047,455 for their work. \$2 Million Awarded to Promote Leadership in Nation's Museums

Ten organizations will receive \$2,074,017 in 2007 awards under the 21st Century Museum Professionals program from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). "I am deeply honored to be included among the distinguished Fellows of the Society." Dr. Martin was honored for his extraordinary contributions to the archival profession over a period of many years. Fellows are elected by a select committee comprising the five immediate past presidents of SAA and three Fellows selected by SAA's governing council. Honorary Fellow of the CILIP

Dr Fiona A. Black, Director, School of Information Management, Dalhousie University, has been elected an Honorary Fellow of the Chartered Institute of Library and Information Professionals (CILIP). She was cited in recognition of "her distinguished contribution to librarianship research and education." Only three individuals in Canada have received this award since it was established in 1896 and two of them are members of Dalhousie's school. In addition to Dr Black, Dalhousie Professor Emeritus Dr Norman Horrocks OC, was elected in 1998. CILIP is the United Kingdom's leading professional body for information specialists, librarians and knowledge managers. It includes members from the United Kingdom and 31 other countries. University of Maryland College of Information Studies Receives New National Science Foundation Grant for Research on Information Technology Innovations

The College of Information Studies is proud to announce that faculty members Ping Wang, Douglas W. Oard, and Kenneth R. Fleischmann have received a three-year \$700,000 grant from the National Science Foundation's Human and Social Dynamics program. The program seeks to foster breakthroughs in understanding the dynamics of human action and development by creating new knowledge about organizational, cultural, and societal adaptation and change. This new research project on "Scalable Computational Analysis of the Diffusion of Technological Concepts" aims to leverage emerging techniques from computational linguistics to populate models that describe the generation and dissemination of specific technological innovations.

By applying automatic tagging and classification to high-volume information flows from multiple sources, the project seeks to create a new middle ground between narrowly focused (but richly analyzed) case studies and existing scalable techniques (e.g. citation analysis) that leverage fewer types of evidence. The project will begin with a focus on information technology as an exemplar field, leveraging the broad and accessible discourse on specific information technologies from both formal and informal sources. Findings from those initial studies will then serve as a basis for applying similar techniques to other fields. This project is one of several in which faculty and students in the College of Information Studies are applying "computational thinking" to create new opportunities that address important research challenges in the social sciences and humanities. Toni Samek Brings the First Annual Library Journal Teaching Award Home to SLIS

Toni Samek, winner of the first annual LJ Teaching Award sponsored by ProQuest, "is a light for human rights and core values", writes John N. Berry III in Library Journal, 11/15/2007. Dr. Samek will accept the award at a special reception to be held at ALA-midwinter in January 2008 in Philadelphia. The award honors Toni's teaching of the core value of the profession, especially intellectual freedom and social responsibility, and comes with an LJ cover and feature story and a \$5000 prize.
