It is our pleasure to bring you the preliminary program for the ALISE Conference 2002: Jazz Mosaic—*Faculty Recruitment in a New Key*. We invite you to set aside **January 15 through January 18, 2002**, to explore questions and design strategies to insure the continuing health of library and information science education.

New Orleans, venue for Conference 2002, is known for its fine food, jazz, the ambiance of the French Quarter, and the charm of its diverse historic neighborhoods. Beyond the food, architecture, music, and night life, recommended attractions include the Ogden Museum of Southern Art (603 Julia Street) and the Louisiana Children's Museum (420 Julia Street). Several sites of the Louisiana State Museum are located in the Quarter: the Cabildo, the 1850 House, and the U.S. Mint (751 Chartres Street at Jackson Square). Beyond the Quarter, the New Orleans Museum of Art (1 Collins Diboll Circle) and the Amistad Research Center at Tulane University are worth the trek. But even if your conference activities preclude extensive planned sightseeing, do take a stroll to enjoy the flavor and charm of this sophisticated and diverse city known for the good life!
